Topic 1: *Health services for women, migrants and youth in Kyrgyzstan* Bolotkan Sydykanov

Due to lack of information, education and financial resources, young women in the rural areas of Kyrgyzstan do not properly use health services. Due to the poor quality of health services, the maternal and newborn mortality rate is high. Inadequate health services also affect migrants, refugees and those living in remote rural areas. In addition the increasing number of HIV/AIDS infected persons is becoming a major problem.

Topic 2: Youth and Conflict in Kyrgyzstan Bakytbek Tokubek uulu

Marginalized youth played a key role during the revolution and ethnic clashes in 2010. This presentation will discuss the role marginalized youth played during and after the April 2010 events, and will focus on the ensuing peace building process. Since then many international organizations have been implementing projects focusing on conflict prevention through youth participation.

He teaches cultural anthropology at the Nazarbayev University (NU) School of the Humanities.
