Tribal peoples' opinion is ignored

- Protected areas assumed to be "wilderness"
- Illegal evictions of tribal peoples around the world in the name of "conservation"
- Tribal peoples can't hunt and gather to feed families or access sacred sites
- When tribal communities loose their land, they will rarely accept this
- But resistance can have dire consequences...







Bushmen - Botswana

- Illegally evicted from CKGR in the name of "conservation"
- Although they won historic legal battle to return to their land, government imposed nationwide hunting ban
- Accused as poachers, they face arrest, beatings and torture, while private game ranchers are allowed to hunt
- Meanwhile mine development continues in "protected areas"

Baka - Cameroon

- Ancestral land has been designated as national parks
- Regularly harassed, arrested and even tortured by park rangers when they enter their forest
- "Anti-poaching squads" are financed and supported by big conservation NGOs such as the WWF
- Without access to the forest, health problems and addiction among Baka rise

Baka – Republic of Congo

- Messok Dja = designated Protected Area (PA)
- Forests are not pristine, Baka managed forests of Messok Dja since time immemorial
- Establishment of PA lead to land theft and human rights abuses
- Now: funders are aware of abuses and investigate

The best conservationists

- 80% of the world's richest areas in biodiversity are the territories of tribal communities
- World Bank (2011): Indigenous peoples are key to preserving the world's forests
- Conservation reserves that exclude indigenous peoples suffer as a result
- Satellite data: forest fire rates were lower by about 16% in indigenous areas between 2000-2008







The best conservationists

- Tribal peoples have extraordinary conservation skills and knowledge of their environments
- Baka prevent over-hunting and even benefit animal neighbors
- Bushmen consume over 150 species of plants and have always hunted sustainably







The solution

- Most effective and cheapest solution: Governments and conservation NGOs must recognize tribal peoples' land rights
- Should work with tribal peoples as real partners and experts and protect their territories from outside threats
- Creation of protected areas requires FPIC by tribal peoples
- ICCAs (indigenous and community conserved areas) can be alternatives







Latest threat – #BigGreenLie

- 30% target for protected areas
- Won't mitigate climate change or enhance biodiversity
- Will increase suffering and destruction
- Biggest land grab in history

It's all a con, and it's harming the environment.








With support from some conservationists and in partnership with many tribal peoples, Survival is fighting these abuses:
