Bodily Experiences of Physically Disabled Women in Pakistan

The dissertation project focuses on the construction of disability in Pakistani society from the perspective of physically disabled women. It aims to explore what perception physically disabled women developed of their body in response to their interaction to the social world and how 'body image' and 'social experiences' interact in the process of identity formation. For the purpose of research, life narratives of 20 physically impaired females from Lahore city were collected by using biographical interview technique. The presentation will be based on the first results of analysis.
